

Governors Responsibilities


The role of the Board of Governors is to manage the school with a view to providing the best possible educational opportunities for all the pupils. This involves working with the Principal in:



Parents/Carers are issued with a leaflet every year outlining Child Protection Procedures within Knockavoe. Staff attend CP updates every year and CP Officers, Principal and Designated Governor attend CP Training every 2 years. The Department of Education requires schools to remind all parents/guardians of the importance of notifying school when someone other than the usual person will be collecting a child from school. All visitors to the school must sign in and wear a visitor badge. Parents/guardians must wait in foyer area until staff member arrives to meet them.

All Volunteers and temporary employees are subject to Access NI Vetting Procedures before working within the school, in line with EA Guidelines.

At Knockavoe School we aim to create a nurturing, child centred approach to learning and strive to provide excellent teaching and learning experiences for all our pupils regardless of their ability, needs or background. We recognise that all children have the right to an education, therefore we endeavour to create a learning environment which not only engages and motivates our pupils to learn, but one in which the efforts and contributions of all our pupils are valued and celebrated (Article 28 & 29, UNCRC). Throughout 2023-2024 we had many curriculum successes and we had a strong focus on celebrating.

Primary Department

In the Primary department, we strive to engage learners through a range of lessons and activities that promote their interests and learning styles. We love play and adopt a play based learning approach where children are actively engaged and part of the learning experience. During the 2023-24 academic year, we explored many themes and topics through our learning and activities, including 'People Who Help Us', ' The Farm' and 'Transport.' Also, we enjoyed engaging in lots of school events such as World Book Day where we enjoyed stories and parades showing off our costumes, visiting Santa in his Grotto, wearing yellow and having a disco for Mental Health Day to name a few. We have endeavoured to promote our outdoor learning through a range of play experiences, incorporating the school environment such as the outdoor classroom, sensory walks, the muga pitch and outdoor gym to name a few, where we love to enhance our learning of curriculum areas such as exploring the weather and seasons (WAU), counting and exploring shapes we can find (Numeracy) and using twigs and natural resources to create our sounds and letters we are exploring (Literacy). The Primary department have had an action-packed year full of fun and learning!

Key Stage 3

In Key Stage 3, pupils benefited from a broad and engaging curriculum, delivered through a variety of teaching strategies and resources. The introduction of the new "carousel" teaching strategy this year, allowed for a fresh dynamic within classes, providing pupils with new perspectives and opportunities for growth. The school embraced the sharing of best practices across the Key Stage, further enriching the learning environment.

Nevertheless, challenges, including the impact of industrial action, occasionally disrupted the consistency of routines. Teachers reported facing challenges and encountering difficulties in differentiating instruction across several classes, each with unique pupil profiles and varying dynamics. Despite these challenges, the flexibility of our approach and reflecting on teaching strategy has allowed us to adapt, ensuring that pupils continued to make progress in their learning.



Key Stage 4/5

The curriculum in Key Stage 4/5 is strategically focused on qualification and accreditation, ensuring that students are well-prepared for future academic and vocational pursuits. Qualifications offered include CCEA ELQ Life-Skills, Mathematics, and Extended Life-Skills, as well as City & Guilds Essential Skills in Communication, Application of Number, and ICT. Through partnerships with South West College (SWC) and 21Training, students also had the opportunity to engage in accredited courses in Occupational Studies and Construction. Additionally, GCSE and ELQ Art and Design with Design and Technology components were available, delivered on-site at the school.

Supporting the academic curriculum, various ASDAN programmes were incorporated into the Key Stage 4/5 provision. These programmes, including the ASDAN LifeSkills Challenge, offered flexibility, allowing for the personalisation of learning to meet the individual needs of our pupils. The "challenges" promoted independent life skills, and the adaptable course structure ensured that all pupils could access meaningful education tailored to their specific needs.

Special Events and Extracurricular Opportunities

Throughout the academic year, pupils were offered a range of special events that complemented and enriched formal instruction. Highlights included Multicultural Day, World Book Day, the Scholastic Book Fair, and the Walking on Sunshine event at the Alley Theatre. The Knockavoe Drama Society's Christmas Performance was another significant event, allowing pupils to showcase their creativity and talents in a supportive environment.

Additionally, pupils participated in a variety of off-site activities, including sensory and soft-play sessions at Melvin Sport Centre and swimming at Riversdale Leisure Centre. Excursions to local parks, community areas, and sites of interest provided real-world learning experiences that supported the development of independent skills and social interaction.



NURSERY CLASS 2023-2024



- All pupils made the transition into Knockavoe School very well.
- The Nursery Class enjoyed taking part in World Book Day, dressing as '101 Dalmatians' as part of a school wide costume.

Class 1A have enjoyed a busy year of fun and engaging and active activities. In the classroom the pupils were always eager to learn, and they embraced fun and engaging Literacy, Numeracy, Art, and Cookery activities. We enjoyed making buns, cakes and tasting new foods. Over the last year pupils in Class 1A have been working hard on, pre-writing skills, numeracy, cutting skills and fine Motor skills.

Class 1A had a new pupil attend Knockavoe School and all the pupils welcomed him and were super happy to have them in their class. There were lots of friendships formed and lots of long-lasting happy memories were made throughout the year.

Class 1A had the super opportunity of meeting with their friends in Class 2A on a weekly basis and socialising with their friends in Melvin Soft Play every Thursday.

Class 1A pupils have enjoyed exploring the different resources in Learning through play inside and outsaid of their classroom. From having fun doing sensory circuits to their favourite play day yet which was the Water Play Day.

We had the amazing opportunity and have eagerly participated in and really enjoyed; Jo Jingles sessions, and they just loved moving, dancing, and singing to all of Jo Jingles songs and rhymes.

Class 1A have also enjoyed physical movement in their outdoor play area as well as at the mugga pitch and the hall and recently had a fantastic school trip to Bready Park where they had a Teddy Bears Picnic. Class 1A has had a very happy, fun, and successful year and look forward to all of the fun adventures to come in Primary 2.





- Class 1B have had a brilliant fun year, all pupils have transitioned well from Nursery into Year 1 with a new classroom and class team.
- Pupils have made excellent progress with their IEP targets which have focused on independence, communication and social and emotional awareness skills (finding their belongings/beginning to put them on, responding to their names/verbal instructions, using PECs/verbally asking for their snack, being aware and displaying a number of feelings).
- A skills-based approach was used for planning, this was collaboratively done with other Foundation Stage teachers. This worked well and provided a good focus for activities during our daily learning through play sessions. Pupils completed 1:1 literacy and numeracy activities, these were planned according to individual ability levels and based upon q-skills identified within the NI curriculum. It is lovely to see the progress pupils have made with these and the improvement in their level of engagement and participation during these.
- Throughout the year our timetable has been evaluated and reviewed, as a result some changes were made which worked and flowed better for the class (e.g. introducing more full class group activities on days we had student support and as the year progressed as pupils were more able for this.)
- Pupils have enjoyed exploring the school grounds this year. We have been able to visit Soft Play, Sensory Room, Muga Pitch, etc. They have worked well on transitioning to and from these places. We have also enjoyed full school activities e.g. World Book Day, Water Day, Sun Day, etc.
- The class has enjoyed a number of special activities throughout the year, our highlights include trips to A-Space, Jo Jingles, visits from Poga and out Teddy Bear picnic at the park which linked well to our 'In the Garden' theme.







Class 2A Successes This Year

- Class 2A have made a fantastic transition into class 2A in the main school building and have had lots of fun this year.
- We have worked so hard on developing our literacy skills, with many pupils developing a love for books and enjoying exploring through song and activities all our phonics!
- We have developed amazing improved concentration and focus during class activities, remaining engaged for longer periods of time and so much enthusiasm for everything we do!
- Amazing use of PECs and class timetable from all pupils, now needing less support and prompting !
- Improved communication from everyone in class, from non-verbal and PECs to using phrases and sentences to communicate wants and needs.





The Class 2B team this year consisted of Judy Duddy (class teacher), and Elaine Gore, Amanda Allen and Elizabeth Mc Gerrigle. The team worked well together, promoting a positive working environment in order that the boys in the class were given the best possible conditions in which to learn. As a new teacher to Knockavoe School I felt extremely welcomed by the class team, Senior Leaders within the school and the school community in general. We have all agreed within the team that it has been extremely fulfilling to see the progress which the boys within the class have made. This has been wide ranging; from academic progress, social and emotional targets met, as well as physical milestones which we have been privileged to be part of such as toilet training, climbing the steps of the bus unaided, as well as pedalling the trikes unsupported in the outdoor playground.

The boys settled quite quickly into the routine of Class 2, after moving classrooms and meeting a new teacher. Soon we were all great friends. During September we began our first of 4 class trips to Aspace Sensory Centre, just outside Derry. We have found this to be a very valuable place for us to visit. The sensory needs within the class were well met in this centre and the staff were excellent. These trips were organised in conjunction with Class 1 B, and it was great for the boys to mix with other members of the school in a social setting. During the first term we also worked hard on settling in and independent self-care. Many of the boys have made and continue to make excellent progress here.

The first term concluded with our Christmas Stay and Play. It was so good to have our parents visit the classroom. We performed some songs and rhymes for them, played together and had so much fun.

The arrival of Poga after Christmas was an exciting start to 2024. This also saw us allow the boys input in the development of their skills. They are encouraged to show us which materials they want to use, either through PECS, spoken language or by pointing. The boys have really loved Creative and Expressive activities such as Music and Art. They enjoyed painting inside and outside the classroom and this has really developed their mark making and expressive language. The boys loved the 101 Dalmatians themed World Book Day and enjoyed seeing Poga, the star of the show.

Our impressive creative skills were on display in the Alley Theatre during the Walking on Sunshine event. Although we were not performing in person, we felt included through the video which we took part in and the lovely songs we learned.

Class 7 Successes This Year

- Class 7 have been working hard on our life skills this year. We have been working together as a team to keep our classroom clean and tidy. The pupils complete a different class duty daily; some duties have been trickier than others, but we have continued to practise and try our best.
- This year class 7 have been getting involved in more activities outside of the classroom and beyond our daily timetable. This is such a big achievement for the pupils; it was lovely to watch them engage in yoga, breathworks, Gaelic, the Fan the Flame mass, celebration days and so much more.
- We have been working on our communication skills throughout the year. Pupils have become more comfortable and confident in sharing news during class assembly and talking about how they are feeling. Pupils in class 7 have been exploring what helps them when they are in the red or blue zone, sometimes this may be a movement break, or some time to relax on a bean bag away from their peers or it may be playing with a certain toy.
- We have been preparing for our big move to the secondary department and look forward to starting our journey as a senior pupils.

The Pupils have also enjoyed therapeutic activities such as swimming, PE, DT, Art and Cookery and have demonstrated great enthusiasm within each of these subjects. The pupils have also been working on looking after their mental wellbeing by participating in wellbeing workshops with Joanne which opened up possibilities for discussion and the exploration of their emotional wellbeing.

There has been many highlights of the year, in which the pupils have created two business. As part of young enterprise, they have created Knockavoe Kraft's and have attended Markets in Belfast, Derry/ Londonderry and Walking on sunshine show. Pupils created a wide range of Winter and Spring crafts and have made a very healthy profit. Pupils have developed fantastic numeracy, communication and problems solving skills as well as team building skills. Knockavoe Krafts were delighted to win an award for team work at the young enterprise event in the Tullyglass hotel.

A second business that pupils started was Rise and Shine Café. This business has been very beneficial in developing pupils understanding of Food hygiene, creating menu's, taking orders, adding costs, making tray bakes and hot food, making cold and hot drinks. Pupils have also developed money budgeting skills and using spreadsheets to keep track of profits and outgoings. The cafe has not only been important for FE2 pupils to develop their employability skills, but it has been beneficial for other pupils in the school as this has developed their ability to transition into a café environment, develop their money, communication and social skills. The café has also made a healthy profit.

A Major highlight not only for the class but for the school has been to achieve Eco School Green Flag award and awarded Best Eco School in Derry/ Strabane District Council. Over the past two years pupils throughout the school have been working towards the three topics of Bio diversity, Recycling and Outdoor learning. All Key stages have enjoyed gardening with Iris/ June and participating in outdoor learning day (World water day, beach day) and a wide variety of workshops.

Padraig's time at school has transformed, he responds so well to PECs and built up his reduced day within 12 weeks to a full day again, he soon became familiar with the structures and routines of SS1 and being part of the room has been a positive experience for him. We said farewell to our Seeva, she has tried her best throughout the year to make the right choice and has completed many simple jobs independently but with adult supervision from a distance.

A sensory rich curriculum was delivered to make Enda's learning journey fun, exciting and accessible to his complex needs. Enda entered an external art competition in which he was voted by

the wider community as first place. Enda won himself and his peers in the senior department tickets to go to the Millennium Forum and watch 'Jack and the Beanstalk' pantomime. Another key highlight was before the Christmas holidays Enda was able to enjoy the Strabane brass band playing festive tunes in the front foyer of our school. Another key date and one for the memory book is the 2024 Formal which was organised to perfection. Enda attended along with his close family circle and was certainly a night

to remember. We danced and enjoyed the music and enjoyed all the craic and joy in each one of the pupils faces. Throughout the term Enda has been fortunate to be given amazing 1:1 sessions from Debutots. Each week Imelda immersed Enda in a story telling session. She tailored each session to suit the needs of the pupil. Each story was exciting, interactive and themes which were age appropriate and relevant to enhancing key lifeskills. This academic year Enda enrolled and achieved 8 ASDAN life-skills accreditations. These include:

Although Enda has faced many challenges with his health towards the end of the school term, we have no doubt he will continue to be his bright, positive and resilient man and return to Knockavoe with a huge smile ready to embark on his final year at school.

Extended Schools

Our Extended Schools programme finished in June 2024 after another successful year with a variety of activities taking place over the course of 7 months. We have continued to strengthen our community links supporting our School Development Plan by inviting local facilitators in to deliver fun and engaging activities to all pupils aged between 3 to 19.

Programmes last year have included developing life and cookery skills with Kate Allison with skills and recipes that are transferable to home life for our pupils. We have supported the health and wellbeing of pupils through Yoga with Edel where activities have included stretches, mindfulness and breathing techniques to maintain regulation. Debutots came on board to deliver interactive storytelling and Jo Jingles continued to provide music and dance throughout all Key Stages. Our music tutors, Mark Carmichael and Drumming with Ronan have provided life enriching lessons to our pupils through a variety of group music sessions and 1:1 tuition. Pupil's have taken part in guitar, drum kit, harmonica and folk singing sessions with both tutors.

Our highlight of the year was showcasing our programme and school in the Walking On Sunshine concert in May 2024. This event allowed us to show the hard work and dedication of our staff, pupils and the wider Knockavoe family to the public.





As the sun sets on the end of another school year it is important to reflect on our Sunshine Room, nurture provision of Knockavoe school.

The staff in the sunshine room are so grateful to end a term with a smile as we consider the role played this year in the lives of the pupils.

The nurture principles are embedded throughout our school and in every class the zones of regulation support and equip our pupils with their ability to express their emotions and identify ways to regulate in a safe way.

Many pupils visit the Sunshine room for either core group, 1:1 sessions, nurture breakfast, or have availed of opportunities such as;

Reflexology Art therapy

Drawing & Talking

Yoga

RDA RINKA fitness Mindfulness

Lego therapy (20 trained staff throughout school now who will further offer this wonderful opportunity for the children)

We have been lucky to work alongside the FoodCloud partnership with our local LIDL store which provides us with a wide variety of food & stock to promote the importance of sharing meals together, preparing foods through cookery & pupils partaking in roles & responsibilities of stock taking, distributing and supporting local communities such as the residential care homes.

Whole school events are organised and reflect the principles of our nurture and provide the pupils of school to celebrate events in a safe home like atmosphere as the family we are.

Our events this year have once again grown and had a ripple effect throughout the school, linking with our local community and extending the power of relationships-

Hello Yellow Day; Mental Health Awareness (bringing little pockets of sunshine to each pupil in school); Well-being Wednesdays; Nurture Christmas Extravaganza in partnership with our wonderful friends from AllState and parents connected to Friends of Knockavoe and FAST;

World Book Day whole school celebration; multicultural celebration day; charity events; Family First success, welcoming pupils and staff from local schools and extending our family ethos through the children of our staff joining us on many special events and extending friendships.





Ending 2023 in Sunshine brought the announcement of our newest family member Póga. With special thanks to the amazing ADNI, training our staff training and ultimately providing our school community the opportunity to have our very own Assistance Dog.

The impact of Póga in our school has been instrumental in further developing and providing our pupils with experiences and therapeutic benefits.

In such a short time the presence and impact of Poga through learning and experiences that will last a lifetime:

Our school embarked on this journey together from puppy themed pancakes, art competitions, taking part in our 101 Dalmatian theme book day, spending time with Poga in class and focus groups.

Training Dogs to Transform Lives


ADNI (Assistance Dogs Northern Ireland) is a charity which aims to improve the quality of life for people with disabilities within Northern Ireland.

Special Celebration





Knockavoe **FAST** (Families and School Together) is a peer support group set up by parents of children with special needs who attend Knockavoe School, Strabane. The group was established in 2017 as the need to provide practical and emotional support to parents was very evident.

The group is made up of (but not exclusively) parents who have children in school or parents with children hoping to join school in the near future.

In May 2022 FAST was awarded charity status by the Charity Commission NI, this will open many doors for our group as it will give us opportunities to access services and apply for funding to run more for parents.

The group currently has 115 members and a working committee of 18 people, who run the charity.

In the last year 2023/2024 we have provided a drop-in support group in the school every Wednesday and Friday morning 10.30am-12.30pm. Through drop-in sessions, this year we have enjoyed Art therapy, Samba drumming classes, Mindfulness sessions, cooking with an Air fryer, aqua fit class, Christmas wreath making and arts, Makaton training, Child protection training, Managing challenging behaviour course, understanding neurodiversity workshop and as a group we have recently started a 12 week course on supporting children's learning. To add to our drop-in sessions parents regularly meet up for coffee mornings and lunch out for support through social interactions.

Throughout the year we have worked in partnership with school staff to help organise various activities for the children, participating in harvest festival celebrations, setting up Santa's grotto, the children's Christmas show and the Lidl charity collection among other activities.

We organised and run a magical Christmas day out to Oakfield park for the children, their parents and siblings. This was a lovely day enjoyed by all.

We organised and run a 5 week FAST summer scheme In July and Aug 2024 for children, their parents and siblings. Our summer scheme hosted 4 weeks of exciting actives for the children and families in the local cricket club grounds. We had Inflata fun with loads of inflatable obstacles, beach party with karaoke and disco, sensory messy play session, petting kids farm with pony rides, finishing off our summer scheme with a bus trip to Lurgybrack Farm for a lovely family day out for all.





Going forward in consultation with parents, We plan to facilitate lots more opportunities for parents to support their mental wellbeing and address issues faced on a daily basis. We hope to run Aqua fit class weekly, walking club, continue Makaton training, Dance fitness classes, art therapy, budgeting/funding information sessions, IT aware training, selfcare information and days out, support available information sessions, peer information drop in sessions, we look forward to working along side members of staff to address issues faced by parents i.e emotional regulation, behaviour management, feeding, toilet training, communication etc.

Our drop-in sessions are relaxed and place no pressure on anyone to participate-Parents just come along, have a cup of tea and a chat! As parents who share a common bond, we can offer practical help and advice on many issues that they may face. This ongoing support has been identified as a life line for many parents and a great way of meeting new people who just basically understand!

What the parents have to say:

"Coming to the group has really helped me realise I am not on my own, every issue I have faced with my child someone else has too, I will never feel alone again."

"What a great way to start the weekend, lots of laughs and good crack with all the girls this morning."

"I've never realised the importance of having some time to myself away from the house, talking to others is so uplifting."

"I have never been a confident person, joining FAST has giving me so much confidence when speaking to professionals or asking for help from others."

"This group is just what the doctor ordered. My friends and family never understood my thoughts and feelings. These girls do. They have been so helpful and kind to me. We really have bonded so well."

"The content of our projects is irrelevant, getting together with others in a priceless priority." "I come out of FAST feeling like I'm ready to take on the world.
